

I Have Finished the Race; I Have Kept the Faith

The Summer Olympics are history. Team America returned home with 40 gold, 44 silver, and 42 bronze medals – 126 in total. What an extraordinary achievement! Second in the medal count was China with 91 medals, including 40 gold. For two weeks, millions of people all over the world were watching the Olympics, even those who usually do not follow sporting events. It is undeniable that sporting competitions are something magical - something that appeals to audiences of every age. Watching sports encourages both adults and children to be physically active themselves and to persist in achieving goals in any areas of life.

In sporting competitions, it is the champions who are in the spotlight of the media and fans. Everyone praises and analyzes those who are the best

and win the gold medals. Those on the other levels of the Olympic podium, with silver and bronze medals, gain great attention as well. But we should also remember those who finish in fourth, fifth, sixth and further places. No doubt, they are also excellent athletes who have been working very hard and tried their best. One must remember that to qualify for a final run in the Olympics with eight runners is a lifetime achievement for many athletes. Even to qualify for the Olympics is something special. Many of those who did not win a medal beat their personal record or even their country's record during the Olympics. We should recognize and appreciate this.

Let's apply these rules to our life as Christians. God didn't create us to be the best in many fields of our life. Obviously, there are many people who exceed our achievements, overtook us, beat us on the track. God, however, is not looking so much at our objective achievements but rather on the relative achievements in specific situations of our life. Jesus' famous parable about talents (Mt 25:14-30) is a clear confirmation that God looks at us exactly in this way: "For it will be like a man going on a journey, who called his servants and entrusted to

them his property. To one he gave five talents, to another two, to another one, to each according to his ability." The man from the parable (God) did not expect that those who received two or one talent must return ten talents as the one who received five. No, he expected all his servants to produce the maximum return from what they had received. This truth about God is very comforting for us. However, it calls us to continuously work hard, like athletes, to not resign easily, and to be persistent in following good and resisting evil. It does not matter if we are first or eighth, or even last. God will notice our efforts and our sincerity, and He will recognize us as gold medalists. There will be many more gold medals for us now and in the future compared to the 40 earned by Team America in these Olympics.

St. Paul, feeling that he is approaching the final years of his earthly life, used athletic imagery to describe his life's

journey: "I have competed well; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith. From now on the crown of righteousness awaits me, which the Lord, the just judge, will award to me on that day, and not only to me, but to all who have longed for his appearance." (2 Tm 4:7-8). He used this sports illustration on another occasion: "Every athlete exercises discipline in every way. They do it to win a perishable crown, but we an imperishable one." (1 Cor 9:24) He concludes this with a call to "do not run aimlessly." As Christians, we don't. We know who we are and what our destination is. We are not like those who "have no hope."

The next summer Olympics will be held in Los Angeles. So, brothers and sisters, we have four years to prepare ourselves. As we "run the race," let's ask our Lord for guidance and support.

Bishop Hicks' Column August 2024



Summer Travels, Part II: Indianapolis

Disneyland has used its original tagline, "The Happiest Place on Earth," since 1955. This summer, I traveled to a place where I experienced a few days of refreshing and true happiness. However, it was not by heading to a theme park in California or Florida. Instead, on July 17, 2024, I drove just three hours to Indianapolis, Indiana, to join over 60,000 people for four full days at the 2024 Eucharistic Congress.

As I approached the convention center on Maryland Avenue, I immediately experienced the "organized chaos." People of all ages were waiting in line for over three hours to get their official credentials and badges, affectionately referred to as "fast passes." Meanwhile, I talked with and interacted with people from all over the world. It was striking that almost no one was whining or complaining, including families with babies and toddlers, and people with walkers or in wheelchairs. Everyone I encountered was happy to be there, flexible with big crowds and long lines, and excited about all the scheduled events and celebrations.

You might be wondering, what did these 60,000 happy people do during those four days at the Eucharistic Congress? Of course, there were many opportunities for Mass and Eucharistic Adoration. Also, there was an amazing Eucharistic Procession during which the Blessed Sacrament was carried through the streets, accompanied by hymns and prayers.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation was offered daily. On Friday morning, when I was exiting the Youth Mass, a nun came up to me and said, "Bishop, we have more people wanting to go to confession than anticipated. Can you hear confessions for a few hours?" Without any thought to my schedule, I immediately responded, "Yes, of course, Sister!"

There were youth gatherings and family events and games, as well as cultural and musical performances. Amazingly, an entire room the size of two football fields showcased exhibits and booths of Catholic organizations, religious orders, and vendors offering religious articles, books, tee-shirts, and information about various ministries and services.

There were scores of gifted speakers providing inspirational talks, plus engaging leaders offering workshops on topics related to the Eucharist, faith, ministries, and Catholic teachings. These

presentations were recorded. I invite you to view some of them to grow in your knowledge and love of the Eucharist at www.eucharisticcongress.org.


A moving highlight for me was celebrating Mass one afternoon for anyone who had traveled from the Diocese of Joliet. St. Mary's parish, which is about 20 minutes walking distance from the convention center, graciously welcomed over 300 of us into their beautiful church. Amid such a large assembly of people, it was delightful to gather and pray with familiar faces and friends from our diocese.

The Congress provided us with an opportunity to grow in our knowledge and love of Jesus and to adore, worship, and receive the Eucharistic Lord. Yet on the closing day, there was also a challenge extended to all of us. We were urged to make sure our experience of the Congress did not become the "best-kept secret." Instead, we were exhorted to go home, spread the good news, and put our faith into action.

At the closing Mass on Sunday, July 21, 2024, Cardinal Luis Antonio Tagle from the Philippines, who is the Pro-Prefect for the Section of Evangelization of the Dicastery for Evangelization, called for a renewed commitment to Eucharistic and missionary conversion. He concluded his homily, saying, "When the priest or deacon says, 'The Mass is ended. Go in the peace of Christ,' . . . please go! What you have heard, touched, and tasted, you must now share with others!" He specifically called us to be Eucharistic Missionaries.

On the penultimate day of the Congress, I took a long walk away from the convention center to get some exercise. I passed a woman standing on a street corner by a remote and deserted gas station. I asked her if everything was okay. She responded, "I am fine. My husband will pick me up in two minutes. I am just so happy with this Eucharistic Congress." I blurted, "Me too! And that's the word, happy! There was a true happiness here felt by over 60,000 people." With a beaming smile, she astutely added, "Well, that's what happens when you keep Christ and the Eucharist at the center of your life!"

Amen to that! And I pray that Christ and the Eucharist, the source and summit of true happiness, bless you with His body, blood, soul and divinity as we go out to live and spread our faith as Eucharistic Missionaries.





Stop Assisted Suicide

A Better Way Forward - A Message from the Catholic Bishops of Illinois

Legislation has been introduced to legalize assisted suicide in Illinois. SB 3499 makes it legal for a physician to prescribe an array of lethal drugs to a person diagnosed with a terminal disease who requests to end his or her life. The Catholic Bishops of Illinois oppose this legislation; there is a better way forward for our state.

Assisted suicide disregards the Hippocratic Oath, "Do No Harm," and sends the wrong message about the role of medical professionals. We cannot say it any better than the American Medical Association: "Physician assisted suicide is fundamentally incompatible with the physician's role as healer, would be difficult or impossible to control, and would provide serious societal risks."

This legislation brings a range of possible abuses. It should alarm us that in states with legalized assisted suicide there are documented cases of people being offered inexpensive lethal drugs to end their life rather than being provided more costly treatment. The poor and those with disabilities are particularly in jeopardy because they are the most vulnerable to abuses. Every major national organization that represents people with disabilities is opposed to assisted suicide.

In Oregon, where assisted suicide has been legal since 1997, data show that pain is not among the top five reasons why a person wants to end their life. Loss of autonomy, feelings of being a burden and being less able to engage in activities that make life enjoyable are most often cited as reasons for choosing assisted suicide. A better way forward is to expand mental health coverage and strengthen social supports such as community programs to help those dealing with depression and feelings of hopelessness.

No one wants to suffer or experience a loved one's suffering. Fortunately, there are effective ways to alleviate suffering or make a person more comfortable at the end of life through palliative care. This relatively new specialty area of medicine cares for the whole person — physically, emotionally, socially, and spiritually — to relieve symptoms and stress that often accompany serious illness or side effects of treatment. A better way forward is to expand the number of palliative care locations and services in all areas of Illinois.


